APCP Matters

APCP National Committee – Working Weekend Glasgow, February 26th-27th 2010

The APCP National Committee, Regional Representatives and Group Representatives met at the City Inn in Glasgow for a Working Weekend at the end of February.

In addition to the regular National Committee meeting, business focused on a number of issues including: the structure of APCP National Committee and clarification of officers' roles and responsibilities; APCP's five-year plan; APCP's response to the CSP's consultation on the future structure of Clinical Interest and Occupational Groups (previously reported on in February's Newsletter); and Paediatric Physiotherapy Competencies.

APCP National Committee

The past few years have seen a number of changes in the operational structure and activities of APCP.

In 2008, APCP contracted an Administrator for the first time to assist with some of the administrative and business tasks of the Association. Since the latter part of 2008 this role has been performed by Fiona Moore, previous National Committee member and former National Treasurer. The process of establishing the specific role and responsibilities of Administrator is still ongoing and Fiona is helping to define this role more specifically to ensure that the Administrator is used effectively and to ensure that the role can be transferred to another individual in the future as and when necessary.

At present the Administrator has responsibility for membership subscriptions and for management and maintenance of the membership database; distribution and sales of APCP publications; administration for some APCP courses; assisting the Conference Organising Committee; assisting with collation and preparation of the APCP Newsletter and publications; and day-to-day management of the APCP website.

The creation of the Administrator's post has inevitably impacted upon some of the roles and responsibilities previously held by certain officers on National Committee and it was agreed that these roles and responsibilities will require clarification over the following year.

The Research and Education, and the PRO and Publications Groups will be meeting separately over the coming months to look specifically at these roles and to consider future activities within these areas. It was agreed that APCP needs to establish a more structured education and training programme for its members and this remit will fall to the Research and Education Group which has recently been strengthened with the recruitment of two new National Committee members – Jane Reid and Jo Brook. The PRO and Publications Group will have a more defined role in the promotion of the Association and in member engagement, and will take on future responsibility for the publication of the APCP Newsletter – formerly the remit of the APCP Editor.

The development of the new APCP Journal will continue to be a big commitment for APCP and we need to continue to recruit to the Editorial Board to ensure good support for the APCP Editor in this project.

APCP 5 - Year Plan

Last year, Linda Fisher suggested that APCP should consider developing a 5-year plan to assist the Association to develop and plan its activities in line with the Association's key objectives. The idea is that this would be a 'living' document both assisting with developing the action plan for the future and with recording and collating the activity of the Association. It will also assist APCP when the Association is required to apply for CSP rerecognition, as we will be required to evidence our activities under stated objectives.

A session was spent looking at the CSP Annual Corporate Plan and the CSP CIOG Structure and Rerecognition Criteria to assist with development of our own 5-Year Plan. The outline of this plan was sketched and the sub-committees, and Regional and Specialist Groups are being asked to input into the content of this plan over the coming few months.

Paediatric Physiotherapy Competencies

A large part of the Working Weekend was devoted a discussion around the issue of paediatric physiotherapy competencies. We were pleased to welcome Gwyn Own who gave an update of the Charting the Future project and next steps. Jane Reid also explained the work of NES in developing the education framework for Allied Health Professionals working with children in Scotland.

Some time was spent looking at some examples of competency documents that have already been published, such as RCN Competency Frameworks , RCSLT Competencies and Charting the Future draft Framework, and discussing the value and implications of APCP undertaking such work at this time.

It was concluded that it is not feasible at present for APCP to undertake such a large project when it is uncertain whether the work would have any real influence for members. It will be important for APCP to influence competency frameworks that are currently being developed and that have implications for paediatric physiotherapists.

The Neonatal Group, however, has already drafted a competency document for physiotherapists working in the NICU. This has been developed as part of the Group's involvement in the Neonatal Taskforce and so may have greater potential to influence the workforce. It will also be a good 'pilot' for APCP to gauge its influence on stakeholders and for members.

It was agreed that APCP may have a more realistic role in supporting members' education and training and that efforts should focus on developing a schedule of courses that deliver pre-defined learning outcomes. It was also agreed that paediatric physiotherapy managers might benefit from some guidance for managers having to develop competencies in the workplace.;

Annual Representative's Conference (ARC)

APCP submitted the following motion at ARC (Motion 14):

Transition can be defined as "the purposeful planned movement of adolescents and young adults with chronic physical and medical conditions from child-centered to adult-orientated health care systems". Transition is recognised nationally as a particularly risky part of the patient pathway and as a result is subject to various national standards.

To support physiotherapists in this area, conference calls on the CSP to:

- produce guidelines for physiotherapists, managers and commissioners on adolescent transitional care to ensure that transition is identified and addressed in all areas in which young people are seen;
- develop and implement a plan that will ensure effective promotion and uptake of these guidelines across relevant parts of the health and social care system in the UK;
- set standards in respect of skills development and training for physiotherapists whose services accept referrals of clients between 13 and 19;
- carry out a survey to identify the training needs of newly qualified physiotherapists who work in services that accept adolescent referrals and, depending on the results of the survey, to positively influence the modification of the

undergraduate curriculum and to work with managers of services to identify appropriate training opportunities for newly qualified physiotherapists.

The motion was presented to the Conference on behalf of APCP by Stephanie Phillips, a physiotherapist working in an adult service that accepts referrals for young people from the age of 16 years.

Stephanie referred to the adolescent e-learning project that was instigated and funded by the DoH and which was developed following a detailed analysis of curricula competencies and training needs of all doctors and nurses, and suggested that of identification the training needs physiotherapists whose services accept referral for clients aged between 10-19 years, and of newly physiotherapists, would physiotherapists with other professional bodies, as well as identifying gaps within the undergraduate curriculum.

She identified transition as a risky part of the patient pathway and that expertise in adolescent care is needed in both adult and paediatric sectors to ensure that as a profession we are getting transition right for young people.

The Motion received a great deal of support from Conference delegates and was passed un-opposed. We will report back to members when a response to this motion is published by Council.



Reports from APCP Specialist Groups

NEONATAL GROUP

The group continues to work towards the objectives set in December for 2010 and outlined below:

Talipes project:

- to gather information on management of positional talipes in order to write a consensus document
- Tummy Time poster:
 - to organise printing, publication and distribution of completed poster

Tummy Time leaflet:

• to liaise with APCP and Irish Physiotherapy Association on publishing tummy time leaflet

Business template:

• to format a downloadable template for writing business plans for input on neonatal units for publication on the APCP website

Parental information:

 to develop a downloadable web based information for parents on positioning and handling of premature and ex-prem infants

Competencies

• to develop competency package for physiotherapists working in neonatology

Regional groups

 to analyse database and assess the possibility of reestablishing regional groups

LAPI course

- to run a LAPI course in Edinburgh in July 2010 Annual study day
 - To plan and run a study day/re-run "Role of the therapist in neonatal care" course

Following the work done by Adare Brady on the now published Neonatal Toolkit (www.dh.gov.uk>home>publications) which makes recommendations for Allied Health Professional involvement on neonatal units, the neonatal group felt that to ensure a high quality of care there was a need to outline competencies for physiotherapists working in neonatal care which would then drive training needs. Adare has written a draft competency which was discussed at the recent APCP National Committee Working Weekend. The Neonatal Group is liaising with the National Committee on how to take this forward.

If you are involved with neonatal care or looking to develop a service, neonatal networks are looking at how to implement the recommendations across the networks.

The Neonatal Group has also contributed along with OT, speech therapists and dieticians, to updating the standards produced by the British Association of Perinatal Medicine (BAPM). Following feedback from the BAPM working party, the overlap between the role of OT and physiotherapy has been amalgamated whilst outlining the unique roles of the professions. These standards are currently in draft format and being considered by BAPM.

Please can members help the group collate information on assessment and treatment of positional talipes? To write a consensus opinion we need your views. To complete a form log onto the Paediatric network of icsp and download "Positional Talipes Survey" from the documents section.

Lastly, a reminder about the Lacey assessment of the preterm infant (LAPI) course being run 12th – 15th July in Edinburgh. There are just a couple of places remaining. Contact the APCP Administrator to enquire about availability of remaining places and booking procedures.

NEW PUBLICATION LAUNCHED!

Guidance for Physiotherapists – Paediatric Manual Handling (2010)

APCP has published a revised edition of APCP's Paediatric Manual Handling – Guidelines for Paediatric Physiotherapists.

APCP members can either download the new publication from the APCP website or can purchase printed copies.

The aim of this document is to encourage readers to:

- be aware of and follow risk assessment guidelines for all moving and handling situations;
- minimise risk by managing and controlling hazards;
- raise awareness of the need for efficient movement in staff to minimise risk of injury;
- promote minimal lifting and safer handling;
- encourage independence whenever possible.

Working with babies, children and young adults or, children with additional support needs, places staff, parents and carers in a continuous 'at risk' situation. The very nature of the work involved means that one is often bending, twisting and stooping to low levels, and carrying a moving, unpredictable load. Although the weight of the load, in some circumstances may be small, the environment, task needed or capability of the assistant or carer may not be ergonomically favourable or ideal. Handling over the sides of cots, moving from the floor, carrying into and out of a car, placing children into and out of therapeutic equipment (including wheelchairs) are just a few typical examples.

This guide has been produced to assist paediatric physiotherapists, not only to comply with current legislation, but to provide them with background information as a useful resource for carrying out risk assessments both in their workplace, (be it a domestic, community or hospital environment) and, on the babies, children and young adults with whom they work.

APCP has a number of other publications already available to members. Many of these can be downloaded by members from the APCP website or hard copies can be purchased from the APCP Administrator using the Publications Order Form on page overpage.

Giving Advice for Children and Young People with Special Educational Needs – Guidance for Physiotherapists (2009)

This document is targeted at paediatric physiotherapists working with children with Special Educational Needs, who are required to write reports for Education.

The document includes an overview of the current legislation relating to educational provision for children with Special Needs - including sections specifically looking at legislation in Wales, Scotland and Northern Ireland; advice and guidance for therapists in writing reports for Education - including suggested formats for these reports; and information on the Tribunal System and how to prepare for a Tribunal Hearing.

The Research and Education Committee have developed an interactive study day for APCP members looking at this subject to support members' practice in this area.

The document is available for members to download from the APCP website and hard copies are available for members to purchase. Complimentary copies are issued to members attending the study day.

The Use of Botulinum Toxin in Children with Neurological Condition - Evidence Based Guidance for Physiotherapists (2008)

This document is targeted at paediatric physiotherapists involved in the management of children with neurological conditions where outline botulinum toxin may be an appropriate adjunct to treatment.

To date there are no standardised pathways or consensus of practice for providing outline toxin injection services for children. Current provision and practice varies from one locality to another throughout the UK.

The document is based on the available clinical evidence together with expert opinion. Throughout the document the recommendations have been graded where appropriate to provide the reader with an indication of the effectiveness of the intervention in relation to the level of scientific evidence.

This document is available for members to download from the APCP website and complimentary hard copies are also available for members to order from the APCP Administrator.

Information to Guide Good Practice for Physiotherapists Working with Children (2007)

This booklet is designed to help address the breadth of wellbeing of children especially those who may be positively affected by paediatric physiotherapy.

APCP Publications

It acts as a signpost to UK government policy and guidance, highlighting those which impact on paediatric physiotherapy practice and shares a list of contact details for a wide variety of information, services and activities that may be helpful for children and young people.

It is intended that this booklet will help and support clinicians working within paediatric physiotherapy services as well as those commissioning, developing and delivering services for children to ensure that children and young people receive a high standard of care.

This document is currently only available for members to download from the APCP website.

Paediatric Outcome Measurement (2005)

This document provides guidance for clinicians and managers in the effective use of outcome measurements within the field of paediatrics. It is a clinically relevant document, incorporating reliability and validity data for the 8 most commonly used measurements in paediatrics. It gives guidance in a non-prescriptive way, offering a range of clinically appropriate outcome measurements for client/patient groups.

The document is due for review but the document is available for members to download from the APCP website and members can also request complimentary printed copies from the APCP Administrator.

Evidence Based Practice in Paediatrics Management if Obstetric Brachial Plexus Palsy (2001)

This document was developed following a literature search and critical analysis of the evidence relating to Obstetric Brachial Plexus Palsy (OBPP). It identifies the evidence available and highlights implications for clinical practice and for research.

A further literature review was performed in 2004 – no new research was identified at this time.

Obstetric Brachial Plexus Palsy – A Guide to Physiotherapy Management.

Following the publication of the above Evidence Based Practice, this document was developed as a practical clinical tool for therapists working with babies, children and young people with Obstetric Brachial Plexus Palsy (OBPP) - relating practice to the evidence. It includes assessment forms and information sheets for use in clinical practice.

Both documents are available for members to purchase and the Guide to Physiotherapy Management document is also available for members to download.

An APCP Working Party is currently in the process of reviewing and updating these documents.

Evidence Based Practice in Paediatrics Hip Subluxation and Dislocation in Children with Cerebral Palsy (2002)

This document was developed following a literature search and critical analysis of the evidence relating to hip subluxation and dislocation in children with Cerebral Palsy. It identifies the evidence available and highlights implications for clinical practice and research.

A further literature search was performed in 2004 and an update published. Both the original document and the update are available for download from the APCP website.

Hip Dislocation in Children with Cerebral Palsy – a Guide to Physiotherapy Management

This document was developed as a practical clinical tool for therapists working with babies, children and young people with Cerebral Palsy at risk of hip dislocation - relating practice to the evidence. It includes treatment strategies and an information leaflet for parents. This document is only available to purchase as a printed copy at present.

Here and There

New Kid(s) on the Block: AHP's in Child Health



In April 2009 AHP's Jane Reid and Pauline Beirne, joined the NHS Education for Scotland Nursing, Midwifery and Allied Health Professions Directorate on an 18 month job sharing secondment within the Child Health team.

A scoping exercise provided baseline information in respect to current educational resources, networks and educational pathways for AHP's within Specialist Children's Services (SCS) and this has formed the basis of their work streams in respect to the National Delivery Plan for SCS focusing on: -

- Education Resources
- Networks
- Education Pathways.

AHP's also identified core learning needs which could be addressed on a multi-professional basis.

Education Resources

The AHP work streams seek to support the development of a range of educational solutions for current and potential AHP's and Health Care Support Workers within Children's Services. This will include seeking to influence providers of pre and post registration education for AHP's to develop educational opportunities for those interested in working with Children and Young People.

To facilitate this an educational framework for AHP's in paediatrics underpinned by a learning needs and learning gaps analysis is being developed.

AHP Children and Young People's Managed Knowledge Network (MKN)

The MKN is a website for all staff working in NHS Scotland with an interest in children and young peoples' health. The main purpose of the MKN is to:

- facilitate education and enable practitioners to access, share and use knowledge based education online;
- offer access to expert information and support for personal and professional development;
- enable specialist communities to set up and manage their own websites and learning outcomes.

AHP's have their own community of practice which is evolving, as well as a Paediatric Respiratory community.

The Paediatric Respiratory community was developed to support pandemic flu trainers. Two "Train the Trainer" days were designed as a collaborative venture between NES and NHS Lothian in response for the potential need to treat an increased number of patients with respiratory symptoms with the H1N1 virus. 24 physiotherapists attended the days and training has subsequently been cascaded to around 150 physiotherapists across Scotland.

Work is also underway to scope and develop an elearning resource

- facilitating pre registration practice placement in Specialist Children Services with the development of learning packages on specific topics;
- specialist and advanced learning and mentoring for staff already working in children's and young people's services and those wishing to move into paediatrics from another clinical field.

Networks

The initial scoping work identified a need and willingness for the establishment of an AHP Children and Young People (CYP) Educational Network to promote and identify:

- innovative educational practice;
- multi-agency and inter professional learning;
- child and young person-centred decision making.

The AHP CYP Educational Network was launched on 21st October 2009 with over 80 delegates. The event provided an opportunity to bring together AHP's, facilitate sharing of best practice for practitioners, to determine the future remit and direction of the network and gave opportunities for practitioners to become involved in NES project work.

By establishing a network, there will be a structured means to identify educational need. This in turn should facilitate discussions and enable education providers to develop educational resources to ensure sustainability in AHP services to children and young people.

Education Pathways

Currently most AHPs "fall into paediatrics", rather than having a planned educational route. The development of an educational strategy will facilitate a pathway and ensure career development as well as sustainability of services.

The 2 key areas at present are:

- Paediatric Health Care Support Workers, and
- Paediatric AHP Advanced Practitioners.

Health Care Support Workers are an essential and valuable group critical to the future of AHP Children and Young Peoples Specialist Services.

The EPM (AHP) remit focuses on identifying learning and education needs of Health Care Support Workers in paediatrics and meeting the educational needs of these in different care settings across the AHP professions. Scoping these learning needs will form a critical component of Learning Needs Analysis and the AHP Educational Strategy.

The Advanced Practitioner succession planning pathway was adapted for paediatrics and also to include AHP's. There are now 2 paediatric cohorts with 13 out of the 18 participants AHP's.

Summary

This is an exciting, productive and innovative time for Specialist Children's Services in Scotland and the AHP Child Health work streams reflect the dynamic and creative projects designed to meet the challenges of the work force in delivering effective and outcomes driven services for Children and Young Peoples Specialist Services.
