



# APCP Working Weekend - April 2024

The Regional, Specialist and National committee members collaborate once a year to discuss the APCP strategy and planning for the upcoming year, along with networking opportunities with other committee members. This year was held at the Ambassador, Bloomsbury London. We had a full agenda over 2 x days, with various discussions surrounding a wide range of topics from education terminologies and courses to specialist / regional video sessions.

### **Translation of APCP Leaflets:**

One exciting project that was discussed at the weekend, was the successful application of the Chartered Society of Physiotherapy (CSP) Professional Network Funding Grant, where 10K was awarded to APCP to enable us to translate a number of APCP parents' / carers leaflets into different languages.

Therefore, APCP are thrilled to confirm that we are now in the process of translating 10 of our commonly used paediatric physiotherapy leaflets into 10 different languages.

This initiative has been possible due to the project leadership from Rachel Knight-Lozano (APCP Publications Officer) and Ally Bacon (APCP Admin).

This project is consistent with our efforts to increase the accessibility of paediatric physiotherapy information - let's not keep our knowledge locked behind closed doors. Our profession is built upon movement, let's move our knowledge in a way that makes essential childhood movement information accessible for all.

Rachel and Ally are leading a core steering group - the Language Translation Steering Group (LTSG). The group meets regularly to support the projects' development. #### **APCP Bursaries:**

2024 saw a bumper year for APCP bursary applications for both education and research funding and we were delighted to see so many impressive applications for the APCP 50<sup>th</sup> Research Birthday Year Award too. We have supported and given out over £30,000 bursary awards to our members this year – congratulations to everyone who was successful.

For the conference this year, APCP will be partnering with the CSP to attend their October conference in Manchester. There will be lectures and courses about Pediatrics with a focus on transitioning care. The APCP will be delivering their own two day Conference in 2025 – the location is yet to be decided but we are very excited to start the planning process for this.

The website is undergoing further changes and has recently had a software upgrade, with a live roadmap calendar with yearly courses coming out soon. The specialist committee representatives were working on a timetable to plan a good spread of courses at various different levels of experience.





## Alan Macdonald - APCP Outgoing Chair - Interview



Having spent over 12 years being involved with the Association of Paediatric Chartered Physiotherapists, I feel a deep sense of privilege when I reflect on the fantastic opportunities that my time has offered to me. ## Supporting Children's Community Respiratory Physiotherapy Services

This guide has been developed by the Association of Paediatric Chartered Physiotherapists (APCP) Respiratory Committee to support members to develop and evaluate community paediatric respiratory physiotherapy posts.

The guide gives some brief information on the causes of respiratory morbidity in children and young people with profound neurodisability. A summary of evidence supporting prevention and treatment and some data from UK community paediatric respiratory services. It then goes on to give suggestions of key metrics to collect to demonstrate the need for services and to audit proposed or existing services. Examples of successful services are provided. Users are free to use the information included in this guide to support local business cases or service improvement projects provided that the source is referenced.

An APCP risk identification matrix which aims to help identify children who have or are at risk of respiratory morbidity is due for publication in 2024 and will be a useful resource to use alongside this guide.

# Respiratory Rick Identification Matrix for Children and Young People with Neurological Impairment.

This risk identification matrix is intended to aid health professionals to identify people at risk of respiratory compromise and to guide actions to prevent or reduce this.

It may be used in a variety of settings, for example; during a routine therapy review, alongside Cerebral Palsy Integrated Pathway (CPIP) assessment, following a hospital admission.

The items have been selected based upon risks identified in the two key documents referenced below: Gibson et al. 2021 (Items 1,2,4,5,8,9,10,12,13), Legg et al. 2023 (Items 11,14,16,17) and on those used by existing community respiratory physiotherapy services (Items 3,6,7,15).

It is primarily designed for use with children and young people aged 0-25 but users may choose to adapt for use with older people. It has not been validated. The identification matrix may be adapted for local use, and in particular the 'actions' column may need amendment depending upon your setting and services.
